Blankets and sleeping bags are always needed as nights can continue to be cold. New underwear and new toiletries and hygiene products for babies and adults are gratefully received. Items which would not be suitable for refugee living, e.g. vintage clothing, suits, evening wear, smart day wear etc. can be sold online by Raft to provide funding for projects for child refugees in camps overseas. Hardington and Penderome WI – May Meeting – at Hardington Village Hall

The May meeting is rather different – the Members are in charge and give the Committee a well-deserved break. This year Kate Palmer stepped up, and led the meeting. After the regular Institute business – birthday flowers, feedback on recent events (including Skittles 'B' beating Skittles 'A'), information on local, Group and County events – Fiona Linten was introduced as the speaker. Her presentation 'Introduction to Gemmology' was fascinating. As a designer and creator of silver jewellery, she explained how she had become interested in gems during the Covid lockdown, to the extent of studying to become a qualified Gemmologist in 2023. This work included all aspects of gems; identification of minerals and the journey from their origin to their use. There are now also synthetic materials which are chemically identical to the natural form which must be understood. Features of gems to be considered range from their beauty, colour, cut/shape, transparency, lustre and how they react to light. Physical qualities of hardness, toughness, stability (resistance to UV, heat or acid for example) must also be considered when choosing the appropriate usage for an item. Over time, precious stones may be reset and ancient pieces reimaged to repair breakages or reflect modern design. After the talk we were invited to examine many samples of gems, and attempt to identify them with reference to a colour wheel. Not at all simple! The meeting concluded with the usual refreshments.

If you would like to come to a WI meeting – please do – 2nd Wednesday in the month, starting at 7.30 pm at the Village Hall. No obligation to join the WI – it is a great way to meet people.

THE PARISH CLERK WRITES...

The May Meeting...

This was the Parish Council Annual Meeting and Robin Carpenter was re-elected as Chairman. Other roles were shared among Councillors as required.

There was one planning application to discuss. This was for an 'Outline Application' for two detached, four-bedroom dwellings with double garages and parking, to be located near the bottom-end of Lyatts Hill. No objections had been lodged, either on line or by word of mouth. A resolution was passed to support the application.

Under highways, it was reported that work was taking place to unblock the drains on Primrose hill. Also, several potholes around the village have been repaired. A Road Closure Notice was received for the High Street. The road is expected to be closed on 04/06/2026. 6.5 hours (09:00 - 15:30) to enable Wessex Water to carry out remedial defect works.

The Clerk reported that the internal audit was now complete, and as both income and expenditure are above the £25,000 threshold this year, there will also need to be an external audit.

The Village Hall committee reported that the recent water leak in the middle of the village hall car park was kindly fixed by Tom Turner (for free!). The Parish Council would like to thank Tom for this, as potentially this could have been quite expensive if using contractors.

The next Parish Council meeting will be held on Tuesday, 16th June, 7.30pm at the Village Hall. The public can speak for a limited amount of time at the start. Hardington Wildlife Notes by Nicola Maybury

It's almost June, and life is bursting out all over the place! As I write this, we are heading into some promised warm weather after quite a cold spell of wind and rain, and everything seems poised for growth. Around the village, climbing roses are looking wonderful against old stone walls, and flower borders are filling out nicely.

There's so much to enjoy at this time of year that it's hard to know where to start. Slow worms are increasingly active, leaving the safety of the compost heap to hunt for food and look for mates. I rescued a good-sized male from an ambitious blackbird on the front grass recently. The pond is once again teeming with newts, and a late-night torchlit examination revealed several males gathered round a female, their tails curled, flickering pheromones in her direction. At the top of Lyatts, I stopped to watch an amazing aerial tussle between two sparrowhawks, quick as lightning. And heading home one evening, a fantastic little weasel raced across the road in front of us – what a treat!

Meanwhile, our garden is reaping (though not literally) the benefits of No Mow May. The flowering lawn is full of meadow buttercups, red clover and ox-eye daisies in bloom among the tall grasses, with knapweed and yarrow not far behind. Together, these plants offer many benefits to wildlife: clovers are rich in nectar, buttercups are a hoverfly magnet, and flower beetles are drawn to ox-eye daisies. Selfheal, black medick, common daisies and dandelions are also attractive to pollinators and grow abundantly in our garden. These favour shorter grass and will flower repeatedly in areas that are cut every three to four weeks. Both these 'wild' lawns form a valuable habitat, supplying food, shelter and nesting sites to a whole host of creatures, including hedgehogs, voles, toads and slow worms. It's not by accident that bats are seen so frequently at dusk over long grass and established hedgerows – they're helping themselves to the insect banquet contained there. Even a small patch of longer grass will welcome in wildlife, so why not give it a go?

This month, look out for:

Fledgling birds of all kinds, peacock butterfly caterpillars clustered on nettles, tiny froglets emerging from ponds, meadow grasshoppers in the long grass, bumblebees disappearing into foxgloves, dragonflies hunting over water, thick-legged flower beetles settling on umbellifers, pyramidal and butterfly orchids blooming in the nature reserve, the crimson heads of great burnet – and so much more.

Happy nature spotting!
